



Johann Martin Bornträger

1723-1802

- ▶ In September 1723, Johann “Martin” Bornträger was born to Lutherans Johann Caspar Bornträger and Anna Marie Antebring in Treysa, Germany.
- ▶ Martin was baptized in the Lutheran church there on September 12, 1723.
- ▶ When Martin was in his 20s, he began working on the Kirschbacherhof near Hornbach for Andreas Leyenberger, who was an Anabaptist.
- ▶ Martin was impressed by the integrity of Andreas’s life and witness as an Anabaptist and they had many conversations about life and faith.
- ▶ Martin and Anna Elisabeth Hanauer were married in 1751 by Pastor Götzen, the Lutheran pastor in Hornbach.
- ▶ When recording the marriage, the pastor noted disapprovingly that they planned to leave the Lutheran church and join the Anabaptists.



Immigration

- ▶ Martin Bornträger arrived in Philadelphia October 5, 1767, on “Sally.”
- ▶ A widely accepted tradition has it that his wife died at sea.
- ▶ Martin’s children were three boys under the age of 16 (Andrew, John, Christian) and possibly two girls (Hannah, married Johannes Graybill, and Barbara, married Johann Georg Feich/Fike).



A Significant Amish Progenitor

- ▶ As of Tuesday, 336,394 of the people in my database of 1,015,471 descend from him, including the spouses who married into the family (33.1%).
- ▶ *Most of the Amish who live west of Pennsylvania likely descend from him (over 50%).*

How to spell Bontrager / Bontreger / Borntrager / Borntreger / Burntrager, etc.

- ▶ Bontrager: 58%
- ▶ Borntrager: 22%
- ▶ Borntreger: 19%
- ▶ Bontreger: 1%
- ▶ Burntrager: 0%





Settlement in Meyersdale, Somerset Co., PA

- ▶ Martin and his sons started the first flour mill at Meyersdale.
- ▶ Son Andrew later moved to Virginia.
- ▶ Son John stayed in Somerset Co. for a time.
- ▶ Son Christian later moved to Indiana County, PA, then later to Ohio. He died in Leavittsville, Ohio.
- ▶ Keith David Bontrager of Bontrager Bicycles (bought by Trek) descends from Christian and is a 7th cousin to Floyd R. Miller and the children of Perry “Jay” Bontrager.



Settlement in Meyersdale, Somerset Co., Pennsylvania


- ▶ Son John Sr. later moved to Conemaugh Township in northern Somerset Co. in 1798.
- ▶ Later still John Sr. moved to Tuscarawas County, Ohio, where he died in Shanesville.




In 1840 Four Men Scouted for Land in the West

1. Daniel S. Miller (1806-1886)
2. Preacher Joseph Miller (Daniel's brother; 1808-1877)
3. Nathan Smiley (1797-1872)
4. Joseph Speicher (1797-1862)

The Two-Month Scouting Trip in 1840





In 1840 Four Men Scouted for Land in the West

1. Daniel S. Miller (1806-1886)
2. Preacher Joseph Miller (Daniel's brother; 1808-1877)
3. Nathan Smiley (1797-1872)
4. Joseph Speicher (1797-1862)

The first two were among those who left Somerset County with their wagons and their families on June 3, 1841, and arrived in Elkhart County on June 29.

Nathan Smiley did not come: his wife was 8 months pregnant when the group left.

Joseph Speicher did not come: his wife was 7 months pregnant when the group left.

With wives and children, the first Amish to settle in Indiana were a group of 24.

Instead of Smiley and Speicher, two of Daniel and Joseph's first cousins (themselves brothers as well) made the trip in 1841. All four were grandsons of John Bornt. Sr.


- ▶ John and Mary had eight children:
 1. John Borntrager Jr. (1781-1856) married Barbara Johns (1782-1870)
 2. Elizabeth Borntrager (1782-1840) married John Lehman (c. 1780-1852)
 3. Barbara Borntrager (c 1783-c. 1852) married Joseph "Sep" Miller (1762-1839)
 4. Mary Borntrager (1785-1882) married Jacob Lehman (1776-1863)
 5. Christian Borntrager (1788-c. 1830) married Elizabeth Hartzler (1788-)
 6. Margaret Borntrager (1790-1850) married David Schrock (1791-1867)
 7. __ [daughter] Borntraeger (c 1793-)
 8. Veronica "Frany" Borntrager (1796-1881) married Samuel Walter (1793-1867)

Highlighted because the majority of Amish and Mennonites today who have Bontrager ancestry descend from this couple.

 4. Maria Borntreger (1808-1896) m. David S. Schrock (1808-1893)
 5. **Joseph “Sep” Borntreger (1811-1908) m. Barbara Yoder (1811-1888)**
 6. Gertrude Borntrager (1814-1891) m. John J. Schrock (1811-1890)
 7. **Christian Borntrager (1816-1907) m. Elizabeth Baumgardner (1816-1903)**
 8. Barbara Borntreger (1819-1902) m. Tobias C. “Dick Christal” Yoder (1816-1875)
 9. Amos James Borntreger (1826-1899) m. Lydia Ann Miller (1828-1898)





 - ▶ Preacher Joseph J. Miller
- ▶ ***We probably could call it the 1841 Bontrager Settlement of Indiana.***





2024 Amish Population



Bontrager Births: The Top Five States


